

#### A NOTE FROM PRODUCING ARTISTIC DIRECTOR DEBORAH BLOCK



Welcome to the world premiere of *The Ever Present* by R. Eric Thomas directed by Brett Ashley Robinson. This production is a culmination of a dream.

A few years ago Theatre Exile was entering a transitional period. We asked ourselves what would the next steps for Theatre Exile look like? Through conversations with staff, artists and the board we decided that evolution did not necessarily mean bigger. We did not want to change the intimate and daring nature of our subscription

series. At this time, we had also started to build a new home at 13th and Reed streets. So we kept the theater itself intimate and flexible. We also wanted to reach more people that may not always walk through our doors. We knew that no matter how wide you open the doors, sometimes being a good neighbor means leaving your home and meeting people halfway.

So we decided to experiment. We would create a new program that would bring the best of our major programmatic pillars deeper into South Philly. The program was called Out of Exile and it took our love of nurturing new scripts, combined it with our dedication to artistic excellence and married it to our commitment to the community.

In our first year, we worked with MJ Kauffman, who had written an all-ages script called *Whisper's Gone*. It went through a final development process though our New Play Development program called Studio X-hibition. The fun, buoyant show about time travel and saving the planet, told through the eyes of a fourth grader, had its world premiere directed by Rebecca Wright with us in the summer of 2019. In order for it to be a shared experience among the different residents of South Philly, we performed it in four parks throughout the area.

After that success, we wanted to take that vision to the next level. We reached out to the very talented R. Eric Thomas and commissioned him to create a work that uplifted the South Philly voice. Soon afterwards, we brought in Brett Ashley Robinson to realize his world, with equal parts creativity, joy and goofiness.

The Ever Present highlights our beautiful diversity and our love of food. It tackles the challenging issue of what to do when people have a different vision of what their neighborhood needs. The play reminds us that understanding is the key to acceptance and visa-versa.

We are proud to launch our 25th Anniversary season with R. Eric Thomas' lighthearted love letter to South Philly to be performed in five parks south of South Street.

Thank you for coming to live theater.

Thank you for joining us in Exile.

Baltimore Center Stage, Everyman Theater, Arden Theatre Company, Simpatico Theatre, Azuka Theatre, Single Carrot Theatre, About Face Theatre, City Theatre Miami, Act II Playhouse and more. He is also the long-running host of *The Moth* in Philadelphia and D.C. and for four years was a Senior Staff Writer for *Elle.com* where he wrote "Eric Reads the News," a daily current events and culture column with hundreds of thousands of monthly readers. **Deborah Block** (She/They) (Producing Artistic Director) has been a consistent figure in the Philadelphian arts community for over 30 years as a director, dramaturg, producer, curator, choreographer, and educator. Deborah has been with Theatre Exile since 2006 and assumed the position of Producing Artistic Director in 2013. Prior to that, she was one of the founding organizers of Philadelphia Live Arts Festival and Philly Fringe (now FringeArts) and was program director for ten years. She received her MFA at Temple University where she taught for nine years. Prior to that, she taught at Rowan University, University of the Arts, and was a teaching artist in

many K-12 programs. She has received much recognition for her professional and educational work including receiving the Independence Fellowship in the Arts and the Albert Benzwie Award for playwrighting. She has sat on many local and national panels. A sampling of her previous affiliations includes Brat Productions, Theatre Ariel, Philadelphia Young Playwrights Festival, The Wilma Theatre, and the CEC. She has worked on over 50 professional productions. For Theatre Exile, she has directed Babel, Among the Dead, Sing the Body Electric, Guards at the Taj, Smoke, Red Speedo, Cock, The English Bride, Gruesome Playground Injuries, Iron, Hunter Gatherers, dark play or stories for boys, Roosters and collaborated on Heart & Soles.

Theatre Exile is dedicated to enhancing the cultural experiences of Philadelphians through the staging of works that engage the imagination. Founded in 1996 by Joe Canuso and Trish Kelly, Theatre Exile was created by a group of artists that explore the complexities of the human condition packed with Philadelphian grit and passion. Exile is the first Philadelphia organization to produce such powerhouse playwrights as Tracy Letts, Lucas Hnath, Annie Baker, Rajiv Joseph, Rona Munro, and Hansol Jung among others. In 2016, Exile was named most fearless theatre by *Philly Currents* and Best Theatre Company by *Philadelphia Magazine*. Exile has received 92 Barrymore nominations, with 19 awards. In 2017, Theatre Exile left their home to begin a new phase in Exile's life. Following her idea to create a new home in their old location in South Philadelphia, Deborah Block with the Board of Directors collaborated with Center City Development and Cecil Baker + Partners, and created a vision for a new theater that honors the art and maintains Exiles goals of working in an intimate and flexible environment. They produced their first play in the new theater in February 2019 and moved their office to the new space in April 2019.
